Johnny Comes Marching to McKinney for Civil War Re-enactment

Let's get this settled right off the bat.

Victoria "Vicki" Day knows that the American Civil War ended with a Union victory and the current whiff of secession in the air is a lost cause. She's also "well aware of the fact that no battles were fought in North Texas during the Civil War."

She also knows that the public is generally unaware that "the North Texas History Center, located one block off the downtown square at 300 E. Virginia St. in McKinney, is the best-kept secret in the area."

Day is the center's executive director, and she says the center's low profile should radically change after its Civil War re-enactment. The Battle for Myers Landing takes place Nov. 7-8 at Myers Park.

And who wins?

"We are an equal-opportunity battle," she said. "Saturday one side wins, and Sunday the other."

"As museum professionals, we do not have an opinion regarding the war. We just present the facts of life during the 1860s. Most of our military re-enactors are able to play both sides because their jackets are reversible." On Nov. 6, a Friday, the center will be closed to the public for education day.

"We are inviting all schools in the Dallas-Fort Worth area to visit us for a day of experiencing history in action," Day said.

"The kids will be able to visit with military re-enactors representing both federal and Confederate troops. We have cavalry, artillery and infantry re-enactors.

"In addition, we have settlers setting up shop for the weekend, blacksmiths, general store merchants, clothiers, flag specialists, ice cream made the hard way."

More than 500 re-enactors are expected over the weekend, and a dance will be held Nov. 7 after the park closes.

"We will have traditional mountain music and a string band and classes on mourning, fan etiquette, tea, artillery and more, and we are inviting everyone to come and join us for the weekend," she said.

The North Texas History Center recently merged with the Denton County Historical Museum, basically creating a regional center for collections and research.

"We are small but mighty," Day said. "Our building was open to the public in 1911 as a post office. It houses a mural painted by Frank Klepper in 1934 portraying Alfred Johnson's newly formed spy company leaving for the Civil War in 1862.

"In addition to our collections and exhibits, we have a terrific education program for children throughout the school year. Over the past two years, we have hosted over 12,000 kids at the history center.

"We also manage the Farm Museum at Myers Park in Collin County. Therefore, we have the flexibility of hosting events at the park several times a year in partnership with the Collin County Commissioners Court," Day said.

The center's regular hours are 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Monday through Saturday and Sunday by appointment. Admission is \$4 for adults, \$2 for children and \$8 for families.

**Excerpts from *Sidelights and Lighter Sides
of the War Between the States***

Truly Prophetic

General Winfield Scott knew that defense of their homes would harden the Southerners' spirit of dissidence. He warned Lincoln, "If you invade the South, I guarantee you that at the end of a year you will be further from a settlement than you are now."

What's in a Name?

Many politicians gathered in Montgomery were pleased at the birth but unhappy with the name they had settled on for the newborn nation, *The Confederate States of America*. That name was finally adopted only because they could agree on no other. Inspired by the concept of each state's sovereignty was one unaccepted suggestion, *The League of Nations*.

Southern Views

"Resolved, that the several States composing the United States of America, are not united on the principle of unlimited submission to their General Government."--Thomas Jefferson, 1798

"Our present condition, achieved in a manner unprecedented in the history of nations, illustrates the American idea that governments rest upon the consent of the governed, and that it is the right of the people to alter or abolish governments whenever they become destructive of the ends for which they were established."--Jefferson Davis, inaugural address as president of the Confederate States, 1861

"Although the South would have preferred any honourable compromise to the fratricide war which has taken place, she accepts in good faith its constitutional results, and receives without reserve the amendment which has already been

made to the constitution for the extinction of slavery. This is an event that has long been sought, though in a different way, and by none has it been more earnestly desired than by citizens of Virginia.”--General Robert E. Lee, 1866

“The Northern onslaught upon slavery was no more than a piece of specious humbug designed to conceal its desire for economic control of the Southern states.”--Charles Dickens, 1862

“If I could save the Union without freeing any slave I would do it, and if I could save it by freeing all the slaves I would do it; and if I could save it by freeing some and leaving others alone I would do that.
